4th Grade News 10-11-19

What We're Learning:

Reading: In reading we've taken a break this week from our mini lessons on story arc to learn and practice routines that help us run our differentiated groups efficiently. Previously, I gave students access to text passages and questions sets online. While some were successful working on the laptops during this time, many were not yet ready to work independently in groups utilizing the computers. We will be switching over to paper and pencil and I will be working with groups teaching very explicit skills such as how to answer comprehension questions thoroughly, finding and citing text evidence in their answers, and using communication skills to justify their answers and thoughts with their group members.

Writing: We are nearing the end of our realistic fiction unit. Last week, I was able to attend an amazing training regarding writing instruction from author Matt Glover. I learned many new skills to improve my student conferring and I got to try out some new methods with the kids this week. We focused this week on reading published material to determine the type of strategies and craft moves real authors use in their own writing and then applying them to our own writing.

Math: We have been busy making a great amount of progress through module 1. Students have been doing an awesome job of persevering through many difficult word problems that correspond to multi-step. multi-digit addition and subtraction problems and then modeling these scenarios with tape diagrams. This week we wrapped up the module, reviewed what we've learned and took the post-assessment. I am very excited to see the growth the students have made over the course of the module!

Social Studies: We have completed our mini unit on space and have now moved on to social studies. We have begun our unit by learning about Washington's earliest people. Students have had the opportunity to form expert groups on six different indigenous tribes in both Western and Eastern Washington. Yesterday we were able to explore many different artifacts provided to us from the Burke Museum. Ask your child what they enjoyed observing most! We also have been learning about how geography and climate affects the way various native tribes lived.
